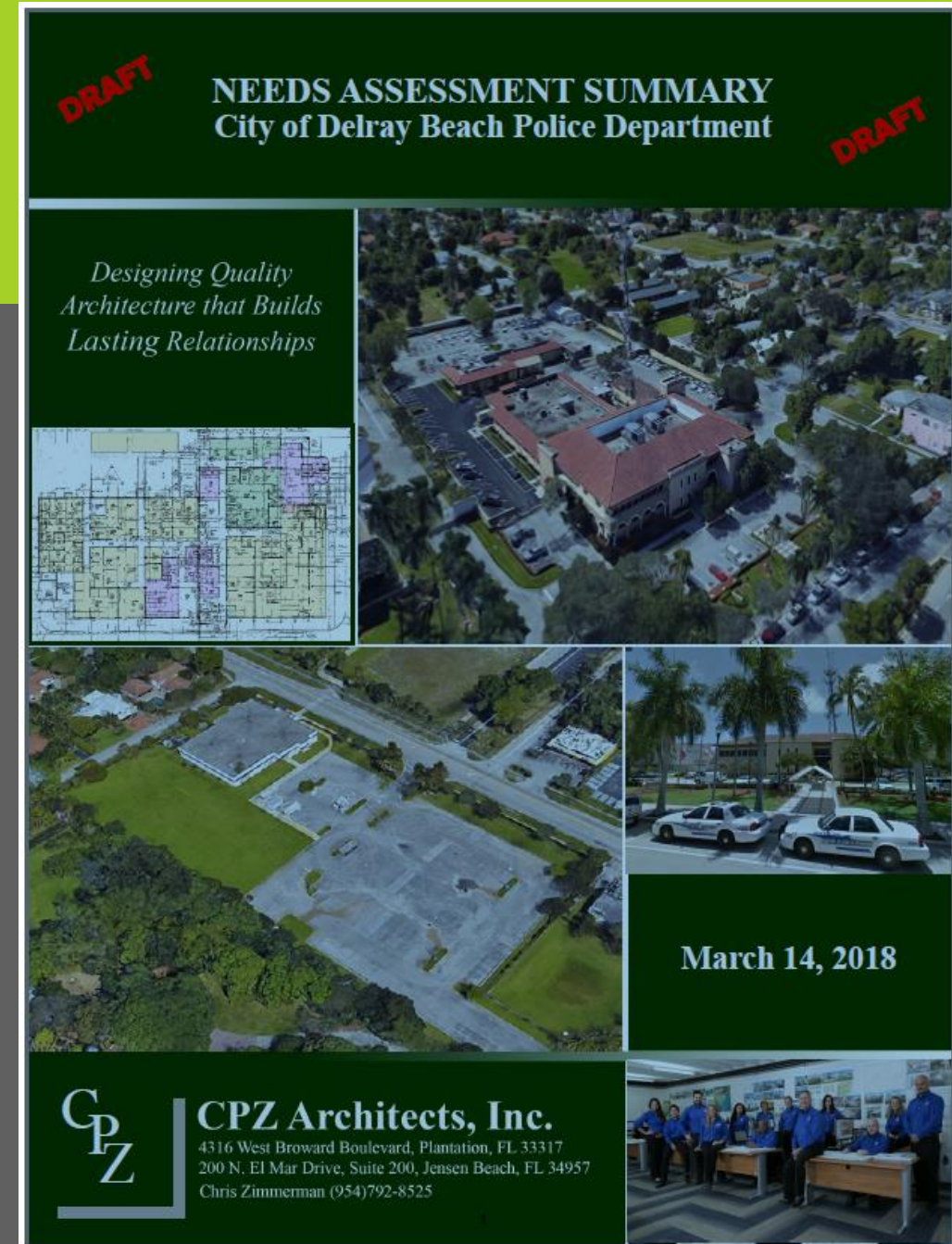


PUBLIC SAFETY

Delray Beach has grown significantly over the last 30 years. As our city grows so does the burden on our public safety facilities and first-responders. The proposed G.O. Bond will finance the costs of much-needed replacements, renovations and innovations to the existing police station (located at 300 W. Atlantic Avenue), Fire Station 112 (located at 501 W. Atlantic Avenue), and Ocean Rescue Headquarters (located at 340 South Ocean Boulevard), as well as fire stations 111, 114, 115 located throughout the city.

POLICE HEADQUARTERS

- Delray Beach has experienced erratic swings in population from time to time, which affects the optimal ratio of police to residents to maintain public safety
- Existing facility designed and constructed in a time when the facility generously accommodated personnel with room to grow
- Within four years, the new facility was no longer adequate
- Space needs analysis conducted by CPZ Architects, Inc. in 2018 determined three times the current square footage is required to accommodate the department with growth through the next 20 years



FIRE RESCUE DEPARTMENT

- Delray Beach Fire Rescue Department has recently completed a Master Plan to accommodate needs for the next 20 years, adopted by Commission on September 6, 2022
- Projects include combining Fire Station 112 and the Ocean Rescue Division into a single building to replace buildings damaged by the proximity to the ocean and to meet hurricane standards and current building codes
- Over the next 15 years, improvements will be made to Fire Headquarters Station 111, as well as stations 115 and 114, to accommodate future space needs and hurricane hardening

PARKS AND RECREATION

The City of Delray Beach has long been known as a world-class location leisure and sporting activities for both amateur and professional athletes. City staff is working to provide parks, facilities, and amenities that meet the needs of both current and future residents, while planning for growth over the next 30 years. The G.O. Bond would fund projects up to \$20,000,000 at Atlantic Dunes Park (located at 1605 S Ocean Boulevard), Catherine Strong Park (located at 1500 SW 6th Street), Miller Park Pickleball Courts and several other parks across the city.
