

Level UP Carver addresses objective 1 and also objective 2. Level UP Carver is a system of incentives that encourage students to participate in the school wide reading initiatives and also math incentives throughout the year. Level UP Carver also supports the positive behavior interventions in which students participate in an school wide incentive program (SIS Rewards) to gain access to school wide events, parties, etc. The intended impact on students is to increase Reading & Math Proficiency as a school and decrease the number of discipline referrals.

What performance measurements and/or data will be used to analyze impact? What outcomes are you anticipating?

PM Benchmark 3 assessment in ELA (measures reading) and Math will be used to measure impact. Also the number of discipline referrals as measured using the Student information System Reports will also be used. I am anticipating and increase in the ELA and Math proficiency (on grade level) data and a decrease in discipline referrals.

What is your project's SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, relevant, time-based) goal (i.e., By May 2024, 98% of students will increase their ELA FAST Assessment proficiency levels by participating in reading and math camps Monday-Wednesday after school.)

- 1. Carver Middle School Students meeting proficiency as measured by the spring 2024 PM Benchmark ELA Assessment will increase by 10% by the end of the year (40%).
- 2. Carver Middle School students meeting proficiency as measured by the spring 2024 PM Benchmark Math assessment will increase by 10% by the end of the year (40%).
- 3. Students receiving discipline referrals will decrease by 20% as measured by the Student Information System (SIS) discipline referral report.

- Incentive Plan with criteria and timelines will be created using Reading Plus
 completion; Growth between Benchmark Assessments; and Positive Behavior Points.
 Students will be surveyed to find out what type of incentives they would like.

- 3. Implement and Document celebrations and incentives with photographs, etc. Also survey student feedback on events and incentives.

How will the project impact your school as a whole?

The money that supports Level UP Carver will go towards incentive events or items for students ranging from certificate paper, parties, dances, field day events, or tokens of appreciation to ensure that students are rewarded for participating in the school wide reading challenges, Math tutorials and opportunities, and Positive Support Point system. This will impact our goal of increasing achievement in the areas of math and reading and also behavior while giving the students the opportunity to interact with each other socially and take something away from the event (positive reinforcement).

How does this project relate to the City of Delray Beach's educational goals: educational advocacy, quality education, extracurricular and lifelong learning initiatives, and community enrichment?
The project relates to the City of Delray Beach's quality education and lifelong learning initiatives by encouraging (through incentives) students to practice reading strategies and math strategies with a little "push" and also recognition of the students "Leveling UP." It also encourages students to exhibit lifelong learning characteristics through the Positive Behavior Awards focus on Citizenship; Empathy; Growth Mindset; Kindness; Respect; Responsibility; and trustworthiness.

The project will service the entire student body.

What is the estimated total number of students to be served by activity? Explain how this number is determined.

Orchard View has a total of 620 students where school-wide "PAWS" expectations are implemented as the behavior management/expectation model. All students are expected to display the PAWS expectations in throughout the whole school day where the PAWS are defined for classroom expectations, hallway expectations, cafeteria expectations etc. 1st-5th graders are invited to tutorial which targets Reading, Math and science intervention which serves approx. 120 students.

What is the total number of low-income students to be served?

Orchard View Elementary is 100% title I which is determined by the free and reduced lunch rate. This translates to 100% of our students are below the poverty line meaning with this grant, 100% of students benefiting would be low-income students.

What is the total number of ESE students to be served?

There are currently 167 ESE students (students with an identified disability) which comprises 27% of Orchard View's total student population that will be served by this grant.

What is the total number of ESOL students to be served?

There are currently 237 ESOL students identified which comprises 38% of Orchard View's total student population that will be served by this grant.

What is the estimated cost per student served? How was the cost determined (i.e., licenses)?

Student incentives cost money. If we were to estimate \$12 per student to receive a "prize, food, award, etc." this totals \$7,440. If we were to estimate each class (41 classes) to receive \$150 for "prize, food, award, etc." this totals \$6,150.

Additionally, if were to estimate \$150 per tutorial group (10 groups) for "prize, food, award, etc." this totals \$1,500. Total cost of supplying school-wide positive behavior and safety incentives = \$15,090.

Describe how the proposed project addresses one or more of the identified City of Delray Beach objectives. What is the intended impact on students?

Pierre's Positive PAWS addresses objective 1, students scoring below grade level in reading, math and/or science as demonstrated through the end -of-year assessments and objective 2, school safety and positive behavior interventions that support character development and a positive learning environment. With expectations being met and results been seen compensation for efforts should be given/celebrated in order to keep the momentum going and students, who do not yet understand the longevity of the impact education will have on their future and careers has. Being able to attach incentives such as pizza parties, awards, etc. to meeting expectations whether that be in their classrooms or outside of them, promotes friendly competition with themselves and others therefore, results in higher levels of success. Early Intervention is critical for students and those in tutorial are making a commitment to stay and work longer hours in order to catch up to their grade level standards- many being one, two, or three grade levels below in reading, math and/or science. In addition, creating a school culture where rules, routines, and respect are at the forefront of every location in the building, promotes and creates students who will act, work, and take care of others in a certain way impacting the greater Delray Beach society and beyond as they age.

What performance measurements and/or data will be used to analyze impact? What outcomes are you anticipating?

Three data points are utilized as a baseline and ending evaluation when it comes to our tutorial students and early intervention: Progress Monitoring assessment 1 and then 3, iReady diagnostic 1 and then 3 and their USA (unit assessments) 1-10. We are anticipating that student will show at least one and half years of growth through early intervention/intensive tutorial remediation at the end of the school year. In addition, by rewarding the PAWS expectations, we are anticipating the school culture to improve thus resulting in lower levels of peer to peer conflict as reflected in mediation sessions with our school as well as being reflected within our discipline (referral percentage) reflecting peer to peer conflict.

What is your project's SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, relevant, time-based) goal (i.e., By May 2024, 98% of students will increase their ELA FAST Assessment proficiency levels by participating in reading and math camps Monday-Wednesday after school.)
By May 2024, 100% of students in tutorial (120) will increase their ELA and Math FAST assessment score by at least one level resulting in a learning gain. In science, students in tutorial (120) will increase their end of year assessment average to above 50%. By May 2024, school discipline with peer to peer conflict will decrease by 50% when compared to FY23 discipline referrals for similar matters.
PROJECT DETAILS AND APPROACH: In three sentences concisely describe your project, including the timeframe and area of focus.
Pierre's Positive PAWS focuses on both increasing academic achievement and promoting/creating expectations around school culture rooted in social/emotional/responsibility from all of of its Orchard View Elementary citizens. A micro focus will be on students in tutorial, approx. 120, utilizing three data points to gauge success/progress/meeting of goals. A macro focus will be on school-wide culture where end of year discipline referrals and school counselor mediation sessions should decrease with implementation, tracking and rewarding from this program.
How will the project impact your school as a whole?
PAWS is a school-wide system that is already in place at Orchard View where expectations for behavior, academics, and safety is seen all over. Adding in competition, incentives and recognition will strengthen the foundation that has been set and improve, overall, school climate and student interaction. Improvement on academics not only impacts a student individually, but as a whole school, creates relationships with new peers and teachers, provides support, and encouragement to improve on their Reading, Math and Science. A student below grade level ism ore likely to have behavior issues and/or emotional issues at school because they cannot keep up. Reward effort and support a student who is below grade level through this journey improves school culture overall.

enrichment?
Pierre's Positive PAWS relates to the City of Delray Beach's educational goals in all aspects. We, as an Orchard View community, are advocating for our student's extra efforts to be recognized as they are working their way to grade level proficiency through quality education. Providing extra opportunities/recognition and showing them that with this hard does pay off creates not only lifelong learners, but lifelong positive and productive community members.
Does this project serve a targeted group of students? If so, explain who the project will serve.
Pierre's PAWS is both a targeted initiative for students who are below grade level, and a school-wide initiative where everyone member of the school community is expected and thus rewarded for their efforts to meet the PAWS school-wide expectations.

Orchard View Elementary school currently has two tutorial coordinators who will oversee the progress and implement the reward/awards for the 120 students in tutorial. They will be responsible for considering daily attendance and reviewing data improvements throughout the year in order to plan and invite specific students whom have earned the reward/award put in place. The school-wide PAWS monitoring and rewarding/awarding system will be managed by homeroom teachers as well as the whole administration team. Feedback will be taken monthly from homeroom teachers on meeting/exceeding PAWS expectations and the administration team will put out weekly targets to focus on, review and reward once mastered.

By signing the filled-out form, you:

- 1. Certify that the TIN you are giving is correct (or you are waiting for a number to be issued),
 - 2. Certify that you are not subject to backup withholding, or
- 3. Claim exemption from backup withholding if you are a U.S. exempt payee. If applicable, you are also certifying that as a U.S. person, your allocable share of any partnership income from a U.S. trade or business is not subject to the withholding tax on foreign partners' share of effectively connected income, and
- 4. Certify that FATCA code(s) entered on this form (if any) indicating that you are exempt from the FATCA reporting, is correct. See *What is FATCA reporting*, later, for further information.

Note: If you are a U.S. person and a requester gives you a form other than Form W-9 to request your TIN, you must use the requester's form if it is substantially similar to this Form W-9.

Definition of a U.S. person. For federal tax purposes, you are considered a U.S. person if you are:

- An individual who is a U.S. citizen or U.S. resident alien;
- A partnership, corporation, company, or association created or organized in the United States or under the laws of the United States;
- · An estate (other than a foreign estate); or
- A domestic trust (as defined in Regulations section 301.7701-7).

Special rules for partnerships. Partnerships that conduct a trade or business in the United States are generally required to pay a withholding tax under section 1446 on any foreign partners' share of effectively connected taxable income from such business. Further, in certain cases where a Form W-9 has not been received, the rules under section 1446 require a partnership to presume that a partner is a foreign person, and pay the section 1446 withholding tax. Therefore, if you are a U.S. person that is a partner in a partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States, provide Form W-9 to the partnership to establish your U.S. status and avoid section 1446 withholding on your share of partnership income.

In the cases below, the following person must give Form W-9 to the partnership for purposes of establishing its U.S. status and avoiding withholding on its allocable share of net income from the partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States.

- In the case of a disregarded entity with a U.S. owner, the U.S. owner of the disregarded entity and not the entity;
- In the case of a grantor trust with a U.S. grantor or other U.S. owner, generally, the U.S. grantor or other U.S. owner of the grantor trust and not the trust; and
- In the case of a U.S. trust (other than a grantor trust), the U.S. trust (other than a grantor trust) and not the beneficiaries of the trust.

Foreign person. If you are a foreign person or the U.S. branch of a foreign bank that has elected to be treated as a U.S. person, do not use Form W-9. Instead, use the appropriate Form W-8 or Form 8233 (see Pub. 515, Withholding of Tax on Nonresident Aliens and Foreign Entities).

Nonresident alien who becomes a resident alien. Generally, only a nonresident alien individual may use the terms of a tax treaty to reduce or eliminate U.S. tax on certain types of income. However, most tax treaties contain a provision known as a "saving clause." Exceptions specified in the saving clause may permit an exemption from tax to continue for certain types of income even after the payee has otherwise become a U.S. resident alien for tax purposes.

If you are a U.S. resident alien who is relying on an exception contained in the saving clause of a tax treaty to claim an exemption from U.S. tax on certain types of income, you must attach a statement to Form W-9 that specifies the following five items.

- 1. The treaty country. Generally, this must be the same treaty under which you claimed exemption from tax as a nonresident alien.
 - 2. The treaty article addressing the income.
- 3. The article number (or location) in the tax treaty that contains the saving clause and its exceptions.
- 4. The type and amount of income that qualifies for the exemption from tax.
- $\,$ 5. Sufficient facts to justify the exemption from tax under the terms of the treaty article.

Example. Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident alien of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

If you are a nonresident alien or a foreign entity, give the requester the appropriate completed Form W-8 or Form 8233.

Backup Withholding

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will not be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:

- 1. You do not furnish your TIN to the requester,
- 2. You do not certify your TIN when required (see the instructions for Part II for details),
 - 3. The IRS tells the requester that you furnished an incorrect TIN,
- 4. The IRS tells you that you are subject to backup withholding because you did not report all your interest and dividends on your tax return (for reportable interest and dividends only), or
- 5. You do not certify to the requester that you are not subject to backup withholding under 4 above (for reportable interest and dividend accounts opened after 1983 only).

Certain payees and payments are exempt from backup withholding. See *Exempt payee code*, later, and the separate Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Also see Special rules for partnerships, earlier.

What is FATCA Reporting?

The Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act (FATCA) requires a participating foreign financial institution to report all United States account holders that are specified United States persons. Certain payees are exempt from FATCA reporting. See *Exemption from FATCA reporting code*, later, and the Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Updating Your Information

You must provide updated information to any person to whom you claimed to be an exempt payee if you are no longer an exempt payee and anticipate receiving reportable payments in the future from this person. For example, you may need to provide updated information if you are a C corporation that elects to be an S corporation, or if you no longer are tax exempt. In addition, you must furnish a new Form W-9 if the name or TIN changes for the account; for example, if the grantor of a grantor trust dies.

Penalties

Failure to furnish TIN. If you fail to furnish your correct TIN to a requester, you are subject to a penalty of \$50 for each such failure unless your failure is due to reasonable cause and not to willful neglect.

Civil penalty for false information with respect to withholding. If you make a false statement with no reasonable basis that results in no backup withholding, you are subject to a \$500 penalty.

Criminal penalty for falsifying information. Willfully falsifying certifications or affirmations may subject you to criminal penalties including fines and/or imprisonment.

Misuse of TINs. If the requester discloses or uses TINs in violation of federal law, the requester may be subject to civil and criminal penalties.

Specific Instructions

Line 1

You must enter one of the following on this line; do not leave this line blank. The name should match the name on your tax return.

Line 4, Exemptions

"It Takes A Village" is a student and staff led initiative to build COMMUNITY at Village Academy. Students, Parents, and Teachers/Staff are coming together to create a positive school environment that affirms, uplifts, and inspires. This project will build deep relationships that benefit school safety, positive behavior, character development, and create a positive learning environment for students and teachers. Funding from the City of Delray Beach will; 1) support teachers in their professional development; 2) support students in feeling proud of, connected to, and loved by their school community; and 3) create a positive learning environment with strong foundational relationships that increase achievement and innovation in school.

What performance measurements and/or data will be used to analyze impact? What outcomes are you anticipating?

Grant outcomes will be tracked utilizing student, parent, and teacher reports taken from school-wide surveys gauging perceptions of safety, respect, and the school environment.

Additional Anticipated Outcomes Include:

- Reduction in incidents of violence, bullying, and disruptive behavior
- Improved student attendance and reduced truancy rates
- Enhanced academic achievement and student engagement
- Increased feelings of safety and belonging among students
- Lower suspension and expulsion rates
- Higher graduation rates and academic success.
- Improved teacher and staff satisfaction and well-being.
- Greater community support and engagement with the school.

PROJECT DETAILS AND APPROACH: In three sentences concisely describe your project, including the timeframe and area of focus.

Over the current school year, Village Academy will host four professional development days- Each of these days will support teachers in learning to facilitate and build positive relationships teacher to teacher, teacher to student, teacher to parent, and student to student. Specific topics will include empathy interviewing, restorative justice, conflict resolution, student-led project-based learning. Additionally a reporting system for safety concerns will be established. By integrating these strategies into the school community, we aim to create a safer, more nurturing atmosphere for students to grow academically and personally. (\$8,000)

In addition to professional development days, Village will also host 2 school-wide events that foster deeper relationships and deeper learning. These events will allow students, teachers, families, and stakeholders opportunities to get to know one another in new ways, co-design projects that support wellness, learning, and connection. These events will be student and teacher/staff designed, organized, and implemented (\$2,000).

Lastly, Village will start a spirit store with Village Academy inspired gear (t-shirts, sweatshirts, stickersect). Merchandise will be designed by students and the store will be run by students. This will support Village Academy's school identity, culture, school pride- all important aspects of facilitating a positive learning environment. The school store will also protect the long-term sustainability of this project. Proceeds from the store will be reinvested in efforts to build COMMUNITY at Village Academy. (\$5,000)

First, ensuring a safe and secure learning environment is a fundamental aspect of educational advocacy. When students feel safe at school, they are more likely to attend regularly and engage in their studies, which promotes better academic outcomes. Additionally, a safe school environment aligns with the goal of providing quality education. Students can focus on learning and teachers can effectively teach when they are not worried about disruptions or safety concerns. Moreover, positive behavior interventions, which promote constructive student behavior and conflict resolution skills, contribute to the overall quality of education by fostering a more conducive learning atmosphere where students can thrive academically and socially.

Furthermore, school safety and positive behavior initiatives can extend beyond the classroom to support extracurricular and lifelong learning initiatives. Extracurricular activities are an integral part of a well-rounded education, and a safe school environment encourages participation in these activities, be it sports, arts, or clubs. Such participation enriches the overall educational experience by helping students develop skills, teamwork, and leadership abilities. In terms of lifelong learning, schools that prioritize safety and positive behavior provide students with a solid foundation for acquiring not only academic knowledge but also the social and emotional skills necessary for continuous personal growth and adaptability in their future endeavors. Additionally, these initiatives foster community enrichment by creating schools that are not just places of learning but also community hubs, where parents and local residents can engage in activities and events, enhancing the overall well-being and cohesion of the community.
