# A-G.U.I.D.E.: Achieving Goals Using Impact Driven Evaluation (A–G.U.I.D.E.)

Application, Guidelines, and Updates to Funding Agreement

#### BACKGROUND & FRAMEWORK

- Since 1997, CRA has provided funding to Delray-based non-profit organizations to assist with achieving Overall Needs identified in the Community Redevelopment Plan
  - Removal of Slum and Blight
  - Land Use
  - Economic Development (A-GUIDE)
  - Affordable Housing (A-GUIDE)
  - Downtown Housing
  - Infrastructure
  - Recreation and Cultural Facilities (A-GUIDE)
- Funding was to targeted nonprofits located in City/CRA-owned facilities and/or providing essential services to the City of Delray Beach
- A-G.U.I.D.E. established in 2011 to better evaluate and measure activities of nonprofit organizations receiving CRA funds in accordance with the CRA Redevelopment Plan

### **ELIGIBILITY & FUNDING**

- Mission consistent with the mission of the CRA
- Classified as tax-exempt under IRS 501(c)(3)
- In good standing with the State of Florida
- Housed in City- or CRA-owned facilities located in the CRA district
- Serves residents of the CRA district and/or visitors that come to the district to participate in funded programs, projects, and events
- Demonstrated commitment by Board of Directors of the purpose and accountability for CRA funds
- CRA support for Non-profit Partners that received funding in prior years will not receive an increase in their funding. In fact, the amount of funding may be decreased according to availability of funds and the quality of their applications relative to these guidelines.
- CRA support may not exceed 25% of an organization's total operating budget for the year in which the grant is requested.
- Nonprofit Partners that have received funding in prior years must submit applications for future funding; no assumption of future funding will be made based on past support.

### MODIFICATIONS OF FUNDING AGREEMENT – WORKING DRAFT

- Require additional supporting documentation with quarterly reports to justify expense of CRA funds for the quarter such as receipts, cancelled checks, paid invoices, etc.
- Must have a long-term lease agreement, management agreement, or other type of agreement with the City of Delray Beach or CRA.
- Make A.-G.U.I.D.E. Guidelines an exhibit to the Funding Agreement.
- Funding availability based on annually approved budget.
- Duty to supplement information provided to the CRA if there are changes from the application.
- Add attorney's fee provision.
- Add termination for convenience clause.
- Lower percentage of budget for CRA support? Currently 25%
