Ms. Sara Maxfield, Economic Development Director, introduced Ms. Lee Anne Korst and Mr. Michael McShea with CBRE. Ms. Maxfield reported that CBRE would help the city prepare a Public-Private Partnership solicitation for the renovation and redevelopment of the Delray Beach Municipal Golf Course located at 2200 Highland Avenue. Ms. Maxfield shared that if approved, CBRE's proposal would include specific services and a fee structure consisting of a cost recovery mechanism for the city when the project is completed.

Mr. McShea highlighted the services that his firm would provide if approved:

- Maximize the city's opportunity while controlling the risk of the project
- Attract qualified development proposals
- Create customized marketing materials that stipulate the city's required renovation and developer upgrade standards
- Market the opportunity with the agreed upon strategy to attract competition for the city
- Support negotiations with the developer to deliver a fair and beneficial project
- Ensure the project achieves the city's vision and economic benefit for the city's citizens

Ms. Lee Anne Korst discussed the approach that CBRE's firm would begin with:

- Meet with the city's stakeholders, elected officials, and residents to discuss assumptions, understanding, and any planned changes to the existing data and project goals.
- Confirm receipt of the information provided to date about the site, including the previous unsolicited proposal(s), deferred maintenance estimates, and ask any questions or request any additional documentation that may have become available
- Present findings at a City Commission Workshop to discuss the redevelopment and priorities

Legal Review, Ordinance No. 10-22

Ms. Gelin read Ordinance No. 10-22 into the record.

Ms. Gianniotes conveyed that Ordinance No. 10-22 was intended to update the language contained in Ordinance No. 66-04 (Article 4.7) by removing the income amount that would allow developers to receive density bonuses in exchange for income restricted units. She added that the rental rates would not be allowed to exceed the qualifying tenant's income level.

Commissioner Boylston motioned to approve Ordinance No. 10-22 on First Reading. Deputy Vice Mayor Casale seconded the motion. The motion was carried by the following vote:

10. COMMENTS AND INQUIRIES ON NON-AGENDA ITEMS:

A. City Manager

 Mr. Moore shared that there would be a Solid Waste and Recycling Services presentation by the recommended companies for the city to engage with at the beginning of May, followed by the final selection in August.

B. City Attorney

 Ms. Gelin announced that there would be a Public Noise Ordinance Workshop on April 21, 2022 at 6:00 p.m. in the Commission Chamber. She advised that the noise consultant would attend to answer any questions.

City Commission

Commissioner Boylston:

 Requested a consensus to discuss creating a building safety ordinance at the Goal Setting Workshop. Deputy Vice Mayor Casale suggested having an Interlocal Agreement with Boca Raton to share in the cost of building inspections.

Ms. Gianniotes clarified that currently, the city is not responsible for ensuring that buildings are being correctly maintained.

- Stated there was mention of having affordable housing at the old Plumosa site by the Palm Beach County School District joint session. He discussed possibly entering a partnership with the School Board.
- Said the Business Development Board acknowledged the need for affordable housing.

A discussion ensued about the availability of land in the city.

Mayor Petrolia suggested the city do a housing study survey.

Deputy Vice Mayor Casale acknowledged the need for affordable housing to help young families and the elderly.

- Suggested scheduling a workshop in May after the Affordable Housing Committee meets.
- Recognized the Super Seniors World Tennis Championship would be bringing business to the local economy in the coming weeks.

Commissioner Johnson:

- Reported that she attended the Regional Economic Development Summit for the Treasure Coast Region with Ms. Sara Maxfield, Director of Economic Development.
- Discussed that people are moving to the southern part of the region due to the high cost of homes in the city.
- Discussed Affordable Housing at the latest Community Land Trust meeting.
- Thanked Mayor Petrolia for advocating the city's participation in the 2022 Wyland National Mayor's Challenge for Water Conversation.
- Thanked Ms. Gelin for preparing the non-profit annual reports.
- Pointed out that there could be a liability for allowing children into the Resource Center located in the American Charter School Center after hours.

Mayor Petrolia mentioned discussing this matter with Mr. Moore.

Mr. Oris advised that Neighborhood and Community Services reported the facility

was primarily being used for tutoring services for no more than two children at a time.

Mayor Petrolia inquired about the charges being collected from the Center.

Ms. Gelin clarified there is a license to tutor at the Center and advised that the license could be revoked at any time.

Mr. Moore mentioned this item would be on the agenda shortly.

Commissioner Casale:

Acknowledged Mr. Metott and his staff for the Turnstiles and Let It Be concert. Ms.
 Casale commended Mr. Metott for the flashlight Easter Egg Hunt and movie.

Mayor Petrolia thanked Mr. Metott for the sunrise service and service from Pastor Bar at Old School Square.

Mayor Petrolia:

 Asked Mr. Metott about Consent Item No. 6.H.2 and 6.H.3 agreement with Fresh Start Landscape Maintenance Company for the promenade and the pavilion. She acknowledged the Garden Club for the plantings by the promenade and suggested if more plantings were needed, they could apply for a grant.
