Where did we begin?

As a reporter for the *South Florida Sun-Sentinel*, C. Ron Allen, got tired of writing about young boys in the police blotter and court system who could have been saved from a life of crime had there been a positive male role model in their lives. He enlisted the support of two local men and, in the late 1980s, began working with three rambunctious boys who were recommended to attend the informal program by local police officers in lieu of getting arrested. They met on Saturday mornings at the old Delray Beach fire station on the northwest corner of West Atlantic and NW First avenues. As mentoring was not a household word, the men assisted the boys with homework and basic life skills. Occasionally, they picked up paper on city property and washed cars for community service hours.

News of the gatherings, soon spread, and the number rose to nine. The three original boys became Pied Pipers and recruited their peers. The organization has been one of the primary sources for mentoring, educating, remediating, and a place of refuge for several hundred boys and girls in South Florida.

Today, at least 700 students (ages 7-17) have completed the year-long program and more than 4,000 others have been impacted indirectly.



We have seen an expansion in youth mentoring from a relatively small youth intervention (usually for youth from single-parent homes) to a cornerstone youth service that is being implemented in schools, community centers, faith institutions, school-to-work programs, and a wide variety of other youth-serving institutions.

In the past 25 years, there have been at least nine mentoring programs for children in Delray Beach. During that same period, six have been defunct, primarily from lack of funding and interest. Mentoring programs require tremendous effort to start, organize, and maintain. Few last more than two years, studies show.

A glance at our *Evolution* since the 80s

March 1989: Local news reporter C. Ron Allen approached then Delray Beach Police Chief Charles Kilgore about enlisting some officers to start a group for area boys who were getting into trouble in the community.

1989-1991: A team of local volunteers, in an informal structure, met weekly with a group of boys at the old Delray Beach fire station on the northwest corner of West Atlantic and NW First avenues.

1991: The program was formally organized and was named DreamMakers. It expanded to the migrant camp on the Rangeline along U.S. 441 in Boynton Beach.

1992: Through a one-year grant from the Florida Chamber of Commerce, it moved to Congress Middle School in Boynton Beach.

August 1993: Delray Beach-West Rotary Club and F.W. Woolworth sponsored the inaugural Back to School Bash at Lake Ida Park. Seventy students and their parents were given snow cones, bananas, oranges and back packs with school supplies. The event grew every year since.

August 1993: The Boca Raton Parks and Recreation Department awarded Allen and Margaret Keefe, a former teacher at Omni Middle School, a grant to operate the SCOPE program at the Old Carver Middle School in Delray Beach and Omni Middle School in Boca Raton. They met with the students one hour each day before school.

April 1996: Grand Master directed members of the Delray Beach Masonic Lodge No. 275 to start a youth program. Local masons adopted DreamMakers and renamed it Knights of Pythagoras No. 5 in the summer of 1996.

January 1997: Attended the second inauguration of Bill Clinton as President of the United States on Monday, January 20, 1997, on the West Front of the United States Capitol Building in Washington, D. C.

January 2001: Attended the first inauguration of George W. Bush as the 43rd President of the United States on Saturday, January 20, 2001, on the West Front of the United States Capitol Building in Washington, D. C.

December 2005: The Internal Revenue Service granted KOPMN its 501(c)3 non-profit status.

November 2006: Visited the Governor's Mansion in Tallahassee to accept the 2006 Florida Governor's Point of Light Award. We also toured Rosewood, Florida A&M University, Florida State University and E-One, the leading designer, manufacturer and distributor of fire engines in

Gainesville over three days.

January 2007: KOPMN sponsored an auxiliary for girls ages 7 to 17. Six months later, KOPMN partnered with nine organizations to form "Lend A Helping Hand" mentoring program at Delray Full Service Center. Volunteers conducted seminars on several pertinent topics. The Department of Agriculture sponsored a small vegetable garden and WXEL Radio staff taught radio broadcasting and basic television production classes after school. Students also received training on preparing a basic meal and washing, folding and ironing their clothes.

October 2007: A high point in the program came when retired businessman Leon Ruchlamer introduced the youth to the art of starting and maintaining a successful business. They operated a retail store for one year, and sold brand name jeans and other clothing.

August 2008: KOPMN launched "Moon Chasers" at Delray Full Service Center to emphasize character for preschoolers ages 3 to 6. Each month, 20 kids were recognized at an assembly for displaying character traits throughout that month.

2008: Dr. Kathleen Weigel, principal of Atlantic High School, invited KOPMN to mentor eight students. Mentors met weekly with them and the number quickly grew to 20 students. The meetings were moved from the principal's conference room to the media center. For the next three years, different speakers including local judges, an engineer for Amtrak, U.S. Congressman Ted Deutsch, Comedian Dick Gregory and former FAU football coach Howard Schnellenberger addressed the students.

January 2009: Attended the first inauguration of Barack Obama as the 44th President of the United States on Tuesday, January 20, 2009 in Washington, D. C. The highlight for several of the children was playing in the snow at a rest stop in Rocky Mount, North Carolina.

2009: The Back to School Bash merged with Spirit of Giving Network to create a larger Bash, which serves up to 3,200 local students

2011: KOPMN began mentoring students at Village Academy. Among the services: sponsored Healthy Sack Pack program where all 60-plus third graders received sack packs with food every Friday, provided athletic shoes for several athletes, arranged for sponsorship for the music and dance programs, assisted in coordinating the annual Career Day and introduced a structured, professionally-run tennis program for third- and fourth-graders in the after school program.

2013: KOPMN was rebranded to KOP Mentoring Network. Board members said the new name (which means Knowledge plus Opportunity equals Prosperity) best depicts the organization's mission.

As youth mentoring has increased in popularity over the last decade, so has the competition for funds to support local mentoring programs. While mentoring programs come in all shapes and sizes—from small grassroots efforts with shoestring budgets to multimillion-dollar nonprofits—

we all face the constant challenge of finding sufficient funds to deliver our services over time.

KOP Mentoring Network faces competition not only from other mentoring programs, but from other youth-serving and social nonprofit organizations as well.

We are blessed and honored to have as an advisor and mentor, Joe Houghton, Vice President of Training and Flight Operations Support, Airbus Americas.



Haughton has been leading us through some resource development planning sessions to create a road map to fiscal stability. These sessions include setting short- and long-term goals for acquiring the financial resources needed to support KOPMN.

We recognize it is important to weather temporary challenges, provide quality services in the present, and maintain a solid foundation for our future. Therefore, we have strengthen our foundation to increase our ability to carry out the organization's mission.

Knowing that an organization with strong organizational capacity is more likely to succeed, we have employed the following four strategies to ensure sustainability:

LEADERSHIP: Our strong formal organizational structure combined with inspirational leadership has permitted KOPMN to achieve sustainable excellence for more than 25 years. Our leadership cultivates and creates an environment that has the capacity to stimulate continuous improvement on a broad front. Our leaders are also adroit at navigating the winds of change and fostering creativity. They support our students in their respective journeys for success and prepare leadersfollowers to address community and market needs



Staffers and mentees are encouraged to draw upon the wealth of experience that exists on our team, which will allow them to proper in the increasingly complex environment in which they operate.

Nonetheless, with additional resources we will be able to positively influence more lives.

PARTNERSHIPS: We know that partnerships or collaborations are most effective when connections are established early and cultivated over time. We have forged some effective partnerships with respected community leaders, groups affected by the problems our program addresses, companies that are essential players in our community and others who are interested in the goals of our program.

Our partnerships have benefited KOPMN's sustainability in many ways, including allowing us to maximize resources through the sharing of space, administrative services and in-kind contributions that have made a huge difference. Shared visibility from media coverage, marketing and other public information that showcases the partnerships have also provided access to potential volunteers.

COMMUNICATIONS: Our communications and marketing strategies involves the use of social media and the local media to inform the public about our program's mission, vision and successes. This creates a base of support for our programs, engage our students, key community members and decision-makers, which has led to new partnerships and funding opportunities.

FINANCE: We use an array of revenue-generating strategies to support our programs with fundraising being the main one. These programs originally were supported entirely with grant funds.

We also have some individual donors who sponsor mentoring relationships or provide in-kind donations of materials or free activities for mentor-mentee pairs.

Sustainability planning has enabled us to determine the resources that are essential to achieve desired program outcomes, identify which program can be carried out with existing funding and which programs require new funding.
