Our organization is driven by the vision of a community in which every youth can access a full range of social, educational and growth opportunities necessary to succeed in life. We adhere to the philosophic tenet that strong and healthy families are the building blocks of our society.

The program will support approximately 45 teens located in Palm Beach County, the majority being Delray Beach residents. EJS Project has served over 200 youth in Palm Beach County. The EJS Project keeps youth residents of The Set engaged in City Commission meetings, with the Delray Beach Police Department, and other local initiatives. EJS keeps youth connected to larger county-wide initiatives when youth voice and participation is needed. Through EJS Project Neighborhood UpLift, youth plan and organize activities to support beautification efforts in The Set twice a year. These beautification efforts consist of clean-ups, paintings and other neighborhood projects. To allow students to practice leadership and civic engagement, EJS includes students in organizational planning committees, quarterly reports to the CRA, and continues to identify and plan community events where students can project manage and volunteer. Students will also participate in weekly Community Conversations in which they engage in meaningful dialogue around race equity, leadership, and positive impact strategies with local leaders and professionals.

- Sensemaker/Neighbors Helping Neighbors** Shortly after the pandemic began our youth began collecting stories through the sensemaker app our partners at Palm Health Foundation created the Neighbors Helping Neighbors Fund. Palm Health Foundation established the fund during the COVID-19 pandemic to help our neighbors in need, in exactly the way they need it.
- Purpose Pays (Career Exposure)** Students explore career options through interactions with local businesses in Delray Beach. These local businesses can work with the EJS Project to develop internship placements in high interest/high impact community organizations and businesses to develop leadership and vocational skills. EJS and partners also plan, recruit, and execute an annual career day that includes mentoring, career exploration, interview practice and much more.
- ET11 (Each One, Teach One)** Enrolled students participate in individual and group mentoring on a weekly basis throughout the year. This consists of writing out and agreeing on SMART goals with a mentor and regular check-ups. GPA's, Attendance and involvement in out of school activities are monitored. The tutoring program supports students struggling academically with one on one support with course work, as well as social activities planned for engagement.
- Project Hub (Drop-In):** EJS Project holds regular office hours weekdays from 2:00 pm to 6:30 pm. Delray youth are able to stop by, hang out, complete homework, and utilize WIFI and technology. This supports a high touch relational approach to service provision.

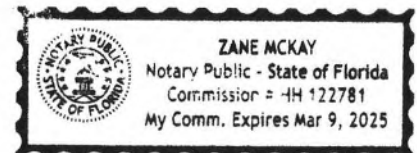

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1. Program Summary (3-5 sentences): Provide an overview of proposed program services.

The EJS Project promotes academic success, career readiness, social and leadership skill development, and civic engagement skill acquisition. Funding provided by the LEFT will support EJS in implementing a high quality and enriching out of school experience for participating youth (yielding high results). Additionally, funds will support EJS in meeting basic needs of the children and families served by providing snacks, hot meals, and assistance with high priority needs. Taken together, programming, food and tutoring will ensure EJS can focus on the whole child and their family unit. This supports basic needs, families' ability to engage in school and programming, and builds EJS's connection to families and the larger community.

2. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria

EJS Project students are between the ages of 13-18, low-income and primarily African American and Haitian, reside in the Set (with a few students traveling from Boca or Boynton, Lake Worth, WPB), and attend a local middle or high school. Students may be excelling in school or struggling academically/behaviorally, but all display a desire to grow and develop as a future leader. The EJS Project seeks students who are making a significant effort to evolve as young change agents. The center being here with our office hours provides a safe place for youth during their down time. This helps promote healthy and productive citizens. It also helps prevent youth problematic issues such as criminal behavior, teen pregnancy and other unhealthy activities. By keeping teens engaged in positive out-of-school activities and exposing them to opportunities that will positively impact their lives we hope to inspire them to strive for more.

STATEMENT OF NEED

3. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location? (USE RECENT, RELEVANT DATA)

Afterschool programs can support social, emotional, cognitive, and academic development, reduce risky behaviors, promote physical health, and provide a safe and supportive environment for children and youth. There is a huge lack of programs and organizations that focus on the 13–18-year population. The



EJS Project primarily targets teens residing in The Set (Northwest and Southwest neighborhoods) of Delray Beach. This area is disproportionately minority, and more than 68% of households and 78% of children live below 200% of the federal poverty line. The neighborhood experiences a juvenile crime rate 39% higher than that of the overall state of Florida, (Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Department of Juvenile Justice Crime Report, 2015). Only 36% of the neighborhood's adult population has a high school diploma or GED (Community Commons, 2017) and the unemployment rate in the neighborhood is 12.1% compared to 4.9% in Palm Beach County. Fifty-five percent of neighborhood residents who work are employed in positions in the very low-wage sales and service sector (US Dept. of Labor, 2015). EJS Project students and their families reflect this neighborhood data. Students are between the ages of 13-18, low-income and primarily African American and Haitian, reside in the Set (with a few students traveling from Boca, Boynton, Lake Worth and WPB)), and attend a local middle or high school.

The funds requested in this application will be used to help underwrite the costs associated with our Bout' Dat Action programming. This programming highlights the importance of youth taking tangible steps to make a difference in their community. The request for 2,500 would underwrite half of the cost of our emergency assistance fund. This fund exists to help the youth and their families in situations of crisis. In the past, the EJS Project has used emergency funds to cover the cost of school shopping, burial of a loved one, move-in cost, medical co-pays etc. The \$2,500 requested for the EJS Project Neighborhood Up-Lift will allow us to provide youth with the opportunity to lead and execute an additional beautification project in their community. Funds received will go toward supplies for the beautification project, catered lunch for the volunteers, and t-shirts and related printing. The \$5,000 requested for the skill-building workshops would underwrite the cost of providing workshops and educational opportunities for our youth to strengthen their skills for tomorrow's workforce. In the past, workshop topics have included: building a resume, applying for financial aid, drug abuse prevention, etc. The costs associated with the skill-building workshops include presenter fees, transportation for off-site workshops, food-related costs, and costs for materials.


